

Lazarus and the rich man.

{...the sin of indifference/omission}

{ Amos 6:1A, 4-7; Psalm 146; 1 Timothy 6:11-16; Luke 16:19-31}

Fellow parishioners, this weekend I would like to share with you a specific aspect of the parable of Lazarus and the rich man who dined sumptuously. Allow me to approach this parable not as a narration of specific offenses committed, but rather as an illustration of NOT doing what we are supposed to do. At the beginning of every Holy Mass, we always acknowledge our sinfulness, beg for forgiveness, and renew our lives. In the traditional penitential prayer {Confiteor....}, we always mention all the forms of sinning; (I confess to almighty God....in thoughts,words.... in what I have done... and in what I have failed to do. Thus, can also sin by not doing what we are supposed to do. This is can also be termed as the sin of omission.

The Lazarus mentioned does not seem to correspond to the Lazarus, the brother of Mary and Martha, whom Jesus brought back to life. This is only a parable meant to bring home a specific teaching. As a matter of fact, the rich man does not do anything physical against the poor Lazarus who has nothing to eat. He does not even mind chasing Lazarus away from his entrance. We are neither told that the rich man is a gluttony nor a corrupt person, gaining wealth in an unjust way. He does not even seem to be bothered by the presence of the beggar, Lazarus, at his gate. He only minds his life and goes on to enjoy the fruits of his labor and this has nothing to do with Lazarus the beggar. There is one important note that the parable mentions; the rich man is aware of the presence of Lazarus who had nothing to eat but did nothing to alleviate his suffering. Unfortunately, both die and find themselves in a reversed reality; Lazarus in consoled life (Paradise) and the rich in tormented flames of fire, a place of suffering. It is only this unfortunate exchange of reality that makes him realize what he would have done to the poor Lazarus while on earth. And now it is Lazarus who seems to have access to the rich man's relatives if they are to be warned about their ways of life in order not to end up in the same situation. From this parable we can still look at the failure of NOT doing what we are expected to do when the chance avails as a sin of indifference. It is a manifestation of not caring at all or not being concerned with what others are going through. It is a fact of being too preoccupied with our business without reaching out to the needy.

We may not anything bad or anything to harm others, and that would be nice, but our faith urges us to do something positive for the wellbeing of others. Unfortunately, even not wanting to do anything, can disqualify us from the Kingdom of God. Christianity means not only being interested in our spiritual and bodily welfare but also of those around us. We are an *ecclesia*, an assembly, one body of Christ {1 Cor 12:12-17}. Whatever affects one part of the body of Christ, affects the other. We pray that we may always be concerned for one another because we profess one and the same faith. At the end of the mass, the priest/deacon dismisses to and be doers of Christ's mission but not mere spectators. We can enjoy our lives with what we have as long as we do not find excuses for any indifference or failure to do what we would have done to help the needy. Amen
